

As the county seat, the City of Howell is centrally located within Livingston County. The city was first known as Livingston Center. It was platted in 1835 by a group of settlers from Detroit, and it was later incorporated in 1863. The City of Howell is known for its fine architecture including a Richardsonian Romanesque style courthouse that is on both the State and National Registers of Historic Places, a Carnegie Library and beautiful homes of many different architectural styles. The population of the City of Howell according to the 2009 SEMCOG estimate was 9,707.

The City of Howell's Historic Downtown, named a National Register Historic District, is a treasure trove of 19th century architecture, much of it restored and preserved for the future. Visitors can choose from a variety of shops, including an eclectic mix of quality clothing, accessories, outdoor apparel, fun and funky specialty retail, restaurants, home goods and decor and personal service establishments. From May through October, the Howell Sunday Farmers' Market offers the best locally grown produce at its State and Clinton street location.

The City of Howell is also the location of four popular festivals: the Michigan Challenge Balloonfest held in June, Melon Festival in August, the Legend of Sleepy Howell in October and the Fantasy of Lights Parade held in November kicks off the downtown Christmas season.

 Livingston County has a residential base of over 180,000 which will exceed 200,000 by 2025.


 Downtown Howell's primary trade area has over 110,000 residents.

 Downtown Howell is easily accessible from I-96 and M-59. Over 20,000 vehicles travel through Downtown Howell daily. Howell is within one-hour driving time from Detroit, Flint, Lansing and Ann Arbor.

 With free downtown parking, walkable streets and continuous public investment, Downtown Howell is great for business. Storefront and office space is available and an active Business Development Committee can provide relocation assistance.



- Area Retail and Restaurants Expanding
 - Nearby Tanger Outlet Center attracts 3.5 million customers annually. Major chain retailers are targeting outlying areas. There are currently eleven successful restaurants in downtown.
- Active Chamber of Commerce and Convention and Visitors Bureau

 The Howell Area Chamber of Commerce hosts the Sunday Farmers' Market from May through October and promotes Downtown Howell as a destination on an on-going basis. They also hold outstanding business development programs and networking events.
- Strong Main Street and Downtown Development Authority

 The DDA was organized in 1991 and Howell became a Main Street community through the Cool Cities initiative in 2005. Downtown Howell's Main Street program gained state and national accreditation in 2008. Main Street is a proven downtown revitalization approach that provides for extensive grassroots business involvement in sales promotions, business retention programs and broad-based community support for downtown and DDA programs.

- Historic Central Business District
 - Downtown Howell is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The Central Business District features many newly renovated Victorian buildings. Design guidelines and a knowledgeable Design Committee help business owners make cost effective improvements. Sign and facade grant programs are available for property and business owners.
- Festivals Attract Over 150,000 Visitors Annually
 - Howell has many events that attract visitors including: Howell History Days, Michigan Challenge Balloonfest, Howell Melon Festival, Concerts at the Courthouse, Fantasy of Lights Holiday Parade and Legend of Sleepy Howell. The Opera House also hosts numerous special events such as live music, art exhibits and private receptions.
- Sense of Community and Quality of Life
 - Howell has over 200 downtown residents and growing. The vibrant downtown features specialty coffee, retail and restaurants, all of which are local independents. The Historic Opera House is becoming Livingston County's center for culture, music and art and the city has an active civic life.

Clothing and Accessories Additional clothing stores of approximately 1,000 – 3,000 square feet each.

Sporting Goods, Hobby and Miscellaneous Unique, independent operator for specialty stores of approximately 1,500 square feet and above.

Stores should be unique and serve as true destination tenants.

Miscellaneous Retail Multiple unique stores, totaling between 1,000 – 4,000 square feet. These businesses could offer giftware, dance apparel, women's fashion and accessories, furniture or home and garden supplies.

Health and Personal Care One store of 1,000 square feet or above, such as a vitamin or health food store, or a store selling specialty soaps, lotions and bath products.

Food and Liquor Specialty stores, such as a gourmet food market, specialty baker, meat market, etc.

In 2007, the City of Howell Downtown Development Authority commissioned Anderson Economic Group to complete a comprehensive downtown market strategy. Trade areas for the Howell Downtown Market were studied and it was determined that several business types would be supported and successful in Downtown Howell, given our considerable trade area growth.

Downtown Howell currently has a large number of high quality, skillfully run businesses. The business types targeted for recruitment are intended to ensure that Downtown Howell captures additional market share within the trade area.

We are currently seeking:

Restaurants and Bars Two or three additional restaurants totaling 10,000-12,000 square feet. The restaurants will range between upscale and casual and appeal to patrons such as professionals transacting business in Downtown Howell and families looking for a downtown experience.



Drive through Howell City Park for a dazzling holiday Christmas tree light display. Everyday in December.


Merry Tuba Christmas
